Our youth ministry at the Clarkston Free Methodist Church is called “The Cove.” It is intended to serve as a refuge for students from the storm of the world. It is a place where we seek to develop students who will love the Lord their God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength, and who love their neighbors as themselves.¹

Welcome to the youth ministry of the Clarkston Free Methodist Church. We are called “The Cove” and there are several reasons why we chose this as our name. For boats, a cove is a place of refuge from the storms of the world. It is a place where it can take refuge from the storms of the world. It is a place where work can be done for when the boat has to go back out into the open sea.

We want to be a youth ministry that any person can come into, knowing that they will be loved and cared for. It is a safe refuge where students can grow, learn, and be prepared to go out into the world to do God’s work.

Our Mission:

To develop students who will love the Lord their God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength, and to love their neighbors as themselves.

Our Ministry Purposes

We believe everything we do in ministry should have a purpose. A model that we've tried to follow is the five purposes in *Purpose Driven Youth Ministry*. The five purposes are:

Worship – loving God

Discipleship – growing with God

Ministry – loving others as God called us to

Fellowship – growing together

Evangelism – showing God to others

How we achieve our purposes:

Sunday Morning 9:15 – 10:15

Goals: Discipleship, Fellowship (in the form of Accountability)

Each week there is an in-depth Bible lesson and time for accountability. We teach 4 questions that we'd like accountability partners to ask:

1. How's your walk with God (Bible reading, prayer)?
2. How are you treating others (family, friends, strangers)?
3. How are you doing in resisting temptations in your life?
4. Open Question – homework, eating right, exercise...

Wednesday Night 6:45 – 8:15 (except during summertime)

Goals: Outreach, Worship, Fellowship

During the evening, we have a band play some music, there is a lesson, we have a game time, and small group time. The evening is geared toward being an easy evening for students to invite their friends. The small group times focuses on students talking about what was taught, and then praying for each other.

Summertime

Our time during the summer is very different. We no longer meet at our usual time on Wednesday nights. Please check to see what events are taking place and when.

Bible Quizzing

We have a program that runs during the schoolyear for students to memorize portions of Scripture and then compete against each other on their knowledge of what they've studied. This is a wonderful opportunity to go deeper in God's word, and to have great fellowship with each other. Open to Jr High and High School students. Please see Dawn McCoon for details.

Blacklight/Puppets

Our blacklight ministry seeks to present truths in an artistic way. Dance, puppets, and creative presentation are put together with groups of students, and then performed in a variety of contexts. Please see Amy Peterson for details.

Praise Band

Our praise band ministers primarily on Wednesday evenings. It is a priority to have students involved in singing and playing musical instruments. If anyone is interested in getting “plugged in” with our praise band, have them see Chris Horvath for further details.

Outreach events

We try to have an outreach event once a month – mini-golf, bowling, movie night, etc. where it is easiest for students to invite their friends. The intent of these gatherings is to welcome new people to the group and to have fun as we fellowship together.

Service projects

We try to have one service project a month – soup kitchen, work project, volunteering opportunity, etc. We believe that followers of Jesus should be servants first, and we want to provide opportunities where students can serve together.

Typical big events during the year

Spring Hill -winter

Every winter we take a trip to Spring Hill for each the Jr High and High School groups. The trip is from Friday after school until Sunday early evening. The cost of this trip is typically around \$120. It helps us immensely to know early who is going, so watch for signup dates and discounts.

Bible Quiz Nationals – summer

Mission Trips - summer

Our typical trips include our High School group going to Mexico and our Jr High group going to West Virginia. Those who are in between the groups (just finished 8th grade, going into 9th grade) can go on the available trip. We typically alternate years for the trips. ('07 was to Mexico; '08 to West Virginia). Watch for details in the Fall. There is a full application and interview process that students must be a part of to go on these trips. There is a large time commitment before and during these trips, and students cannot join the trip once the application time is over. If your student is interested in one of these trips, please make sure they are serious about the commitment.

All Male Retreat/All Female Retreat - summer

We plan each year to do a retreat with guys to one place and gals to another. This is for those students who have finished 8th grade and higher. It is a time to reflect, relax, and get ready for the school year without the distraction of the opposite sex. Cost is typically around \$30.

Behavior

We teach a safe environment for students here at the Cove. This means that students who come, can expect to be free from verbal, physical, and sexual harm.

Any offense to this policy, if deemed serious enough by the staff or a leader, is grounds for immediate removal from the group. We will contact a parent or guardian so that you are aware of the situation. If there are repeated violations to our standard of behavior, we may ask a parent to be in the group to help us watch their student.

Social Networking – Facebook, Myspace

Connecting with friends through the internet is becoming increasingly popular amongst teenagers. Our goal is to have our teens behave responsibly on these internet networking sites. The written word can still be as harmful as the spoken word, and we will strive to address the same issues in the same way.

We encourage parents to be very involved in what their teens are doing online. It is a very good idea to have teens and parents sit down at a computer so both are familiar with what is being done on the computer in the house, and even away from the house. Bottom line – we encourage students and parents to communicate about what is appropriate to do on a computer.

Dress Code

We expect students to dress in appropriate ways on any activity that we do. There are many things that may make clothing inappropriate, but these are some standards we expect to have followed.

- Writing or pictures on clothing should not be vulgar in content
- Undergarments should not be visible
- For guys, pants should be pulled up and not sagging
- Shorts must be fingertip in length
- For swimming events: Swimsuits must be a one-piece or have two pieces that connect (tankini) and guys cannot wear Speedos

Teens and Driving

Teenagers are discouraged in driving to events. We provide transportation to each event we host. In the event that a teen needs to drive to an event, a note is required from a parent or guardian stating the teen's name, the date(s), and the event(s) that the teen is allowed to drive.

If a teen wants to ride with another teen, a similar note is necessary. It should state the riding teen's name, the driving teen's name, the date(s), and the event(s) that the teen is allowed to ride with a fellow teen.

Youth Accounts

Teens have an opportunity to earn money through fundraisers. Any teen may participate. This money is kept in an account managed by the church and our youth account coordinators. This money that is raised can only be used for church events.
